II. Activities of the Standing and Ad Hoc Committees

A. Committee on Committees & Positions, CHAIRS: Amanda Burgess Proctor and Brenda Sims Blackwell

This committee is responsible for soliciting DWC volunteers to serve on both DWC and ASC committees. In January 2013, the committee sent a call for volunteers for 2014 ASC committees. Google Docs was used to facilitate online committee sign up. The committee compiled the list of DWC members willing to serve on ASC committees and forwarded it to the chair of the DWC, Amy D'Unger. Amy sent an email to Joanne Belknap (ASC chair in 2014) with all of the volunteers' names and contact information.

The committee also solicited nominations for ASC executive positions through the DWC listserv. Committee members were also asked for nominations. After compiling a list of potential candidates,

we located vitas and forwarded the list and vitas to ASC. Nomination materials for Claire Renzetti and Kim Cook for ASC Executive Counselor were sent to Jody Miller, and Claire Renzetti was selected for the slate.

B. External Awards Committee, CHAIR: Tara Richards

The External Awards Committee works to identify appropriate DWC members who might be strong candidates for awards presented by the ASC. The committee began its work in January 2013, as most award nomination deadlines are in March. C. Ad Hoc Constitution and By-Laws Committee, CHAIR: Chris Rasche

The Constitution and Bylaws Committee was tasked with proposing two amendments to the DWC constitution.

First, changes were made to the structure of the Executive Board so that there are now five (instead of four) Executive Counselors. Two are junior faculty or in the early stages of their career, two are senior faculty or are in the later stages of their career, and one is a graduate student. The graduate student position was the major change/addition to the constitution in the area of board structure.

Second, the position of DWC Archivist was formalized. Chris Rasche has been serving in this capacity, as the files of the DWC are archived at her university. However, the Executive Board felt it was important to formalize this role moving forward, with the DWC Archivist being appointed by the chair.

Both of these changes to the DWC constitution were voted on by members of the division in good standing, and both received overwhelming support. The addition of the graduate student representative received 94% support and the formalization of the DWC archivist role received 100% support. The Outreach Committee worked to prepare the Division table for this year's conference. The committee coordinated the tasks of sending requests for individuals to sign up to work at the table, as well as soliciting books from division members to raffle off at the business meetings. The committee decided to revise the new member book raffle to include undergraduate and graduate students in coordination with the Student Affairs Committee with the hopes of increasing student and overall membership. Finally, Outreach has been working with the 30th Anniversary Committee to raise awareness for the "30-for-30 Campaign" by having flyers and stickers made for the table in Atlanta.

Since November of 2012, the Committee on Teaching and Pedagogy has focused on two areas: teaching roundtables for the 2013 ASC meeting and developing an assignment collection. First, we organized three roundtables – “Teaching about Rape and Sexual Assault,” “Teaching about Race, Class and Gender,” and “Teaching Sensitive Topics Online.” We recruited discussants for each of these roundtables through the committee and the DWC membership. Second, we began developing an assignment collection. We solicited assignments through the listserv in August and will continue our work on this collection into 2014.

The Student Affairs Committee aims to encourage participation and career development, especially among students. Its main activity is the mentoring program, which was developed in 2011. There are currently about 15 mentor/mentee pairs, matched together based on professional and research interests. We will encourage mentoring pairs to meet at the Annual Meeting and to attend the DWC Social.

Moving forward, we will continue the mentoring program and solicit new participants. We plan to collect feedback from Mentoring Program participants regarding ways to develop effective mentoring relationships. We will distribute this information to current and potential participants.

We will start gathering information regarding various awards, grants, fellowships, and competitions to which DWC students may be interested in applying. We aim to compile a reference list for students and other DWC members.

The DWC Student Paper Competition committee started advertising for the paper competition during the summer 2013. The competition announcement was posted numerous times to the DWC listserv and was advertised in ASC's *Criminologist*. The advertisement was also posted to the Face Book pages for the DWC and the Victimology Section of the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences. Committee members also relied on their own scholarly networks to pass along information about the competition and encourage submissions.

This year a total of 30 students participated in the competition – 27 graduate students and 3 undergraduate students. This was a substantial increase in participation from past years. In 2011 we had 20 submissions and in 2012 we had 25 submissions. Each paper was blindly assigned to 2 committee reviewers. The paper with the highest average score was deemed the winner in both categories (graduate and undergraduate). Papers were assigned scores based on the following criteria: content is relevant to feminist scholarship, strong contribution to the knowledge base, accurately identifies research limitations, analytical plan well developed OR strong theoretical foundation/cohesive theoretical argument, and clarity/organization of paper.

The winner of the graduate student competition for 2013 is Yi Ting Chua (Michigan State) for her paper "The Role of Gender and Risk Perception among Police Officers: General Lifestyle Risks and Occupation-Specific Risks." The winner of the undergraduate competition is Georgia Valentine (Occidental College) for her paper "Challenges Formerly Incarcerated Women Face: How a Reentry Program Can Offer Support."

H. Nominations for DWC Officers Committee, CHAIR: Helen Eigenberg

Nominations were solicited by sending an announcement to all DWC members who had paid their dues, as well as an email to the DWC listserv and DWC Facebook page. Candidates were nominated by others or self-nominated.

Open positions for 2013 - 2015 included Chair and three Executive Counselors—one an early stage career selection, one a later stage career selection, and one a graduate student. Nominations were closed on October 1, 2013.

a. Keynote Speaker

- In September 2012 we sent an invitation to US Supreme Court Justice Sonia Sotomayor to serve as our DWC30 keynote speaker. Her chamber asked us to follow up with them in spring 2013, so we reached out again in March 2013, at which time Justice Sotomayor's office declined our invitation.
- In July 2013 we sent an invitation to **California Attorney General Kamala Harris** to serve as our DWC30 keynote speaker. Her office asked us to follow up with them in spring 2014, which we plan to do. Note that AG Harris is up for reelection in November 2014, which may impede her willingness/ability to participate in our event. We think it is likely that timing challenges will prevent AG Harris from accepting our invitation, but we will contact her office again in the spring and proceed from there.

b. Other Events/Possible Speakers

- It is clear that timing/logistic challenges may prevent us from securing a "high-profile" keynote speaker as we had originally planned. Therefore, we propose two other speakers/events.
- In September 2013, with the assistance of committee members Emily Lenning and Michelle Hughes Miller, we sent invitations to the following two people:
 - **Lateefah Simon**, formerly of the Center for Young Women's Development and currently of the Rosenberg Foundation, both based in San Francisco. Her work with

adjudicated girls/women is featured in the documentary film, *Girls in Trouble*. She has agreed to participate in our celebrations in some capacity. Her speaking fee is negotiable. We told her representative that we would discuss as a board this November and get back to them afterward.

- **Rhodesa Jones**, of the San Francisco-based Medea Project, a theatre troupe of formerly incarcerated women. Her agency has agreed to participate in our celebrations in some capacity – most likely a performance of the theatre troupe followed by a talk/workshop/panel featuring Ms. Jones. The fee is in the range of \$2500-5000, but is negotiable. This agency seems very interested in participating. We told them we would discuss as a board this November and get back to them afterward.
- We are pleased that both Ms. Simon and Ms. Jones have expressed interest, and recommend asking them both to participate as speakers.
- Another possible outlet to consider is Oakland, CA-based Justice Now, an organization that works on behalf of incarcerated women (www.justicenow.org).
- We are open to additional suggestions for speakers/events.

c. *Feminist Criminology* Special Issue

- We received 13 submissions for the special issue. As of November 2013:
 - **Three manuscripts have been accepted** (one from each category: theory, methods, praxis)
 - **Three manuscripts are undergoing a second round of revision.** We expect to receive the revised manuscripts in December/January and to make our final decision shortly thereafter. The quality of the revisions will determine which, if any, of these three manuscripts will be included in the special issue. If suitable for publication, revised manuscripts not selected for the special issue will be sent to the regular *FC* queue to await publication in a regular issue.
- Chris Rasche has agreed to write an introductory essay, and the co-editors will write a brief editorial introduction. Thus, the special issue is shaping up very nicely and is on target for its fall 2014 publication date.

d. Fundraising

- In October 2013 we launched the website for the **30-for-30 Campaign**, a fundraising effort dedicated to securing donations in \$30 increments to celebrate the DWC's 30th anniversary. We are working with the Outreach and Social Media Committees to ensure this campaign (and website) will be heavily promoted in the year leading up to the 2014 Annual Meeting.
- To date, the 30-for-30 Campaign has received \$510 in donations.
- **We ask all DWC members to actively promote this giving opportunity, and to contribute to it. In order to have the type of celebration we all want, we need funds!**

J. Committee on Criminologists Working Outside of Academia, CHAIR: Becky Block

Criminologists who work outside of academia can face marginalization. They may be ignored, feel unrepresented by groups such as the American Society of Criminology (ASC) or the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences (ACJS), and have nowhere to go for mentorship and support. This situation has two kinds of negative consequences, for the criminologist and for the field. For the criminologist, it requires a special kind of courage to face disrespect from your peers, it can be frustrating to have important information to contribute to the field but to feel that your voice is not heard, and the unique

difficulties you may face working in a public or nonprofit agency or a private organization are seldom addressed by the ASC. For criminology, the field becomes poorer when the perspective, experience and knowledge of those working outside of academia are not heard. As just one example, those whose job it is to take care of datasets and to help people to use data hold data integrity as perhaps their highest priority, and are an essential source of information about ways in which the ASC might work to increase data integrity. Mainstream academia, on the other hand, can find it convenient to ignore or gloss over threats to data integrity. By opening doors to collaboration between criminologists working in academic and nonacademic settings, the field is in a better position to address this and other extremely important issues.

Every year it seems that criminology has been paying more attention to the inclusion of criminologists working outside of academia, and to increasing the degree of “collaboration literacy” in the field. The committee on Criminological Careers Outside of Academia was established in 2004 in the Division on Women and Crime (DWC), although its membership and participants include people from throughout the ASC. The goals of the committee are the following:

- to further the support and mentoring of those who have made (or who want to make) a career in practice, research or policy outside of the traditional academic tenure-track system;
- to encourage the ASC to recognize contributions to the field made by criminologists working outside of academia;
- to encourage dissemination of practical research results to people who can apply the results to practice; and
- to provide a forum to discuss issues of data integrity, maintenance and archiving, and work to improve data quality and data availability.

At the suggestion of the committee, the DWC established in 2005 and first awarded in 2006 the Linda Saltzman Award for Contributions to Practice.

Although we are a committee within the Division of Women and Crime, we welcome as members and interested partners people within and outside of DWC. In particular, the Committee has reached out to other ASC Divisions, including the Division on People of Color and Crime, the Division on International Criminology, and the Division on Corrections and Sentencing. It has also reached out to agencies with a special focus on criminological practitioners, such as JRSA.

In 2013, the Committee focused on one of its key objectives—building a mentorship program to link criminologists who have built a career outside of academia with those who would like to know how to go about doing that, and with young professionals who need a place to go for advice. In this endeavor, we are working closely with the ASC mentoring program, guided by Bonnie Berry. Becky (Carolyn Rebecca) Block has joined the newly-formed Mentoring Committee of the ASC, which met for the first time in November, 2012, discussed with Bonnie and others how to best fulfill the Committee on Criminological Careers Outside of Academia’s goals while coordinating with the ASC, and wrote an article for the “Keys to Success” series that appeared in the *Criminologist*. Winners of the Saltzman Award were among the first to volunteer to serve as mentors. In addition to fostering long-term mentor-mentee relationships, we want to build other opportunities for the communication of knowledge about working outside of academia, such as an “Ask a Mentor” column on the DWC website. So far, committee members like these ideas; now we have to put them in action.

K. Special Events Committee, CHAIRS: Stacy Mallicoat and Amy D’Unger

The primary duties of this committee continue to be planning for the social and business events of the Division on Women and Crime at the annual meetings of the American Society of Criminology. The DWC functions to be held at the 2013 annual meeting in Atlanta include a social at an off-site location

(Max Lager's) and two breakfast business meetings. The first breakfast meeting will include an awards ceremony. The goals are to provide an opportunity for socializing and conducting business, minimize expenses, and have good food all at once.

This year's social was held off-site at Max Lager's Woodfired Grill and Brewery, located at 320 Peachtree Street NE. Based on last year's ticket sales and the improved state of DWC budget in 2013 compared to the past several years, we allocated \$4,000 for the social. Final costs for the event are below. We estimate that approximately 200 people purchased tickets to the event, while 121 actually attended.

N. Internal Awards Committee, CHAIRS: Carrie Buist and Jennifer Colanese

As with years past, the committee began circulation of the call for nominations in July. Each year we have several avenues that we use to garner nominations. Alana Van Gundy and Molly Dragiewicz took on the duties of posting the call to the various outlets we have traditionally posted the call (DWC and ASC websites, DWC listserv, *The Criminologist*, and the DWC Facebook page). We ensured that the call was posted multiple times.

The deadline for submissions was October 8th. This was decided based on the timeframe the committee had to get the call for nominations into *The Criminologist*. In total, the committee received nominations in 4 of the 7 categories. We received 4 nominations for New Scholar and one nomination for each of the following awards – Distinguished Scholar, Saltzman, and Sarah Hall. This brings the total nominations this year, in these 4 categories to 7. Unfortunately, I must report that this is the lowest number of nominations we have had in the last three years (13 in 2011 and 10 in 2012). We made many of the same efforts to solicit nominations this year, however, we did not contact past winners directly. Since I, Carrie Buist, have served on this committee since 2008, I can attest to the fact that nominations per year can vary greatly. Some current committee members have emailed me with suggestions for new ways and different outlets for garnering more nominations for next year. Molly Dragiewicz suggested keeping the nomination materials for those nominees who do not win and contacting their nominators next year. Co-chair, Jen Colanese suggested methods to solicit nominations at the annual meetings.

Voting took place between October 8th – October 11th. After the decisions were made the information was sent to Brenda Blackwell who has graciously helped the committee with ordering the plaques. It should be noted that Brenda has taken on this task for the last several years (I, Carrie Buist, have been on the committee since 2008 and I believe she has done this for us since then, if not longer). However, beginning next year, Brenda will be turning that task back over to committee members. She has told me that she will provide the committee with the name of her contact and future orders can be placed and delivered to the conference hotel. As I indicated in last year's report, I strongly suggest that the Division decide on a specified amount we are willing to reimburse for the purchase. Last year, co-chair Jennifer Colanese found that the least expensive plaques in her area were \$50-\$60 dollars before engraving. Therefore with the potential of having 7 awards every year and in turn 7 plaques, this can be costly.

After voting for the winners, the committee members' last responsibility will be to write brief speeches for the award winners and present them with their awards at the DWC breakfast meeting. All award winners will be contacted and encouraged to attend the event.
