Tasks for the associate editors are divided up by section. Following are the tasks and guidelines for each section.

#### **Member News**

- Email listserv, soliciting news and announcements from members. This can include new jobs/change of jobs, publications, calls for papers, funding opportunities, calls for papers, etc. etc.
- Type up news in an unformatted MS Word document (not PDF) and send to editor by material submission deadline.

# Ask a Senior Colleague

- Email listsery, soliciting questions from untenured faculty members, as well as tenured faculty members willing to answer them. Both are done confidentially.
- Select from potential questions and send them out to tenured faculty members, to be answered confidentially.

- Make sure to look over previous volumes as not to duplicate any recent questions answered.
- Type up questions and answers in an unformatted MS Word document (not PDF) and send to editor by material submission deadline.
- The names of those who have asked questions are NOT included. Names of those who have answered questions are included at the end of the section, with no indication of who answered what question.

## **Book (or Article) Reviews**

- Select recent and/or classic books to be reviewed.
- Make sure to look over previous volumes as not to duplicate any recent books or articles reviewed.
- Email listserv, soliciting volunteer reviewers. Alternately, ask among colleagues who are members of the DWC.
- Obtain reviews from reviewers, and then collate them into an unformatted MS Word document (not PDF). Send to editor by material submission deadline.

#### **Graduate Student Corner**

- Compile information that will be helpful for current graduate students. This column is really up to your discretion and creativity.
- Make sure to look over previous volumes as not to duplicate any recent material.
- Possible topics could include transitioning from graduate school to a first job (including books and other resources), workshops and conferences with sessions relevant for graduate students, "Ask a Graduate Student" type questions—confidential responses from graduate students, issues regarding teaching and academic jobs, issues regarding non-academic jobs, important books and articles for scholars of gender and crime, etc.
- Type up material in an unformatted MS Word document (not PDF) and send to editor by submission deadline.

# **Outreach Committee Report**

- Compile information on the activities of the DWC Outreach Committee.
- This column becomes particularly important in preparation for the ASC meetings in November. Items that focus on the role of DWC and its members in the larger ASC, as well as the relationship between the DWC and the other Divisions are especially appreciated.
- Type up material in an unformatted MS Word document (not PDF) and send to editor by submission deadline.

#### **Member Profiles**

- Review questions used in previous member profile interviews. Make revisions, if warranted and desired, to interview questions.
- Choose 1-2 members to be profiled. An ideal pairing would be a more senior scholar with a newer "up and coming" DWC member.
- Make sure to look over previous volumes as not to duplicate any member profiles.
- Contact potential "profilee" and email questionnaire.

• Compile interviews and type up material in an unformatted MS Word document (not PDF) and send to editor by submission deadline.

# **Employment and Funding**

- Keep track of all applicable job openings, funding opportunities, and calls for papers that are available.
- Compile interviews and type up material in an unformatted MS Word document (not PDF) and send to editor by submission deadline.

## **Teaching Tips**

- Email listserv for possible contributions to the section.
- Search relevant journals and/or online resources for pedagogical information on teaching classes on crime, gender, justice, victimization, etc.
- Consult with the Committee on Teaching and Pedagogy about any relevant issues that might make for an interesting newsletter item, including information on teachingrelated sessions to be held at the annual meeting of the ASC.
- Compile information/report and type up material in an unformatted MS Word document (not PDF) and send to editor by submission deadline.

New columns are added on the basis of available material and commitment from an associate editor(s) to maintain the section.

# **DWC Committee on Teaching and Pedagogy 2015 Annual Report November 8, 2015**

The committee organized two DWC sponsored teaching roundtables for the upcoming 2015 ASC meeting:

- 1) Classroom Conversations about Police Excessive Use of Force (Chair: Melencia Johnson) In light of the recent media coverage of police brutality and police officer involved shootings of African American men, instructors in the criminology and criminal justice classrooms should not avoid getting involved in this conversation. Since students are likely to have formed an opinion on these incidents due to the abundance of media coverage and their anticipated career paths, it is important their opinion also be informed by academic knowledge. In this roundtable, participants will discuss a variety of methods employed to respond to and stimulate a conversation about the dynamics of police (excessive) use of force.
- 2) Troubleshooting Title IX: Implications of Mandatory Reporting and Strategies for Teaching and Learning (Chair: Allison Foley)

In response to a growing recognition of the problem of sexual assault on college campuses, the federal government has recently advanced its efforts to hold universities accountable. Critics, however, express concern that the voices of survivors and scholarly experts--faculty--are not adequately represented as universities convene task forces to do the work necessary to come into compliance. The American Association of University Professors, for instance, has come out in opposition to policies that define all faculty as "responsible employees" or mandatory reporters. In this roundtable, faculty

involved in such efforts will share their experiences and the strategies they employed to remain effective scholars and teachers in the face of new mandates.

The committee also developed an on-line teaching resource to be shared with the division. The document will be shared through Google Drive so that all members can contribute and it can be easily updated. As of now, the document lists a variety of courses taught by DWC members and asks for their recommendations for textbooks, readings, videos and other sources. The committee is currently working on adding their contributions to the document. Allison will give a short announcement at the DWC breakfast about the project and the committee will share the link with the membership after the ASC meeting.

The DWC Student Paper Competition committee started advertising for the paper competition during the summer of 2015. The competition announcement was posted twice monthly to the DWC listserv between June and September, was advertised in two issues of the ASC's *Criminologist*, and was included in the DWC newsletter and on the DWC webpage. The advertisement was also posted to the Facebook pages for the DWC. Committee members also relied on their own scholarly networks to pass along information about the competition and encourage submissions.

This year a total of 11 students participated in the competition – 8 graduate students and 3 undergraduate students. Unfortunately, participation was lower than in previous years. Each paper was blindly assigned to three committee reviewers. The paper with the highest average score was deemed the winner in both categories (graduate and undergraduate). Papers were assigned scores based on the following criteria: content is relevant to feminist scholarship, strong contribution to the knowledge base, accurately identifies research limitations, analytical plan well developed OR strong theoretical foundation/cohesive theoretical argument, and clarity/organization of paper.

Notably, this year, we had a tie for the winner of the graduate student competition. The award recipients are Eryn O'Neal, of Arizona State University, for a paper entitled "Victim cooperation in intimate partner sexual assault cases: A mixed methods examination" and Megan Welsh, now of San Diego State University, for a paper entitled "Confronting the limits of caring and the burdens of control amidst carceral realignment: Formerly-incarcerated women's self-governance work."

This year's recipient of the undergraduate student paper award goes to Megan Smith, now of the University of Maryland, for a paper entitled "Preparing for Release: Women's Perceptions on Reentry Workshops."
