Walter DeKeseredy was awarded the 2023 Ralph Weisheit Lifetime Achievement Award, American Society of Criminology's Division on Rural Criminology.



Emma Jennings-Fitz-Gerald is a second year PhD student in the Department of Sociology at the University of Toronto. Her research interests include military sociology, sexual misconduct at work, gender and crime, coercive control, and intimate partner violence. Her dissertation research focuses on veterans' and service members' experiences with and understandings of sexual misconduct policies and reporting practices in the Canadian Armed Forces. Emma is a recipient of the **Aruna Jain International Travel Grant (2025)**.

Kaelyn Sanders is a Ph.D. Candidate (ABD) in the School of Criminal Justice at Michigan State University. Using critical and intersectional frameworks, Kaelyn's research sits at the nexus of community supervision, reintegration, and inequality, and her dissertation research qualitatively explores digital inequality among Black returning citizens. Kaelyn's past research has been published in the *Feminist Criminology*, *Crime & Delinquency*, and the *Journal of Criminal Justice Education*. Kaelyn is also a 2024 National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine Mirzayan Science and Technology Policy Fellow, a National Science Foundation Graduate Research Fellow, and an alumni of The Ohio State University, where she received her B.A. in Sociology and Criminology. Kaelyn is the recipient of the **Claire M. Renzetti Domestic Travel Grant**.



Nicole McKenna, PhD (she/her), is an Assistant Professor at John Jay College of Criminal Justice in the Department of Law, Police Science, and Criminal Justice Administration. Her research focuses on girls in the juvenile legal system, experiences of trauma and victimization, and trauma-informed interventions. She adopts a social justice lens, as well as a critical feminist, anti-racist, and trauma-informed perspective in her research. She has a strong track record of working with communities and agencies in New Jersey including the Youth Advocate Program, New-Jersey Scholars for Transformative Education in Prison, the Juvenile Justice Commission, and the Restorative and Transformative Justice hubs, as well as juvenile detention centers across the United States. Nicole is the recipient of the **Community Engaged Scholar Award**.



Ellen Van Damme, PhD, is a criminologist specializing in ethnographic research on women, gangs, and migration. From 2016 to 2020, she was a PhD fellow of the Research Foundation-Flanders (FWO) at the Leuven Institute of Criminology (LINC), KU Leuven. Her doctoral research focused on the role of women in and around gangs in Honduras. In 2021-2022, she was a Fulbright scholar at the Center for the Study of International Migration at the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA), where she examined female migration from Honduras to the United States. Since 2022, she has been a postdoctoral researcher at the Université libre de Bruxelles and a consultant for the United Nations Development Program (UNDP). In 2023, she founded Field Research Coaching, a consultancy that trains and coaches academics and professionals working on sensitive topics in challenging environments. Ellen is the recipient of the **Aruna Jain International Travel Grant (2024)**.



Women in Corrections Conference February 19-21, 2025 Bangkok, Thailand

Join the **International Corrections and Prisons Association (ICPA)** and the Thailand Institute of Justice (TIJ) as we commemorate the 15th anniversary of the Bangkok Rules in 2025. We offer an opportunity to celebrate progress, assess implementation, and identify areas for further improvement.

The United Nations Rules for the Treatment of Women Prisoners and Non-custodial Measures for Women Offenders, known as the Bangkok Rules, were adopted by the United Nations General Assembly on December 21, 2010. These rules were developed to address women's unique needs, vulnerabilities, rights in the criminal justice system and encourage the use of non-custodial measures. The Bangkok Rules, particularly, Rules 29-35 and 67-69, which emphasize the importance of data and evidence-based research, training, and capacity-building on gender equality and women's rights for prison staff, can serve as a foundation for gender-sensitive policy development and enhance a common understanding of women's pathways to prison.

To raise awareness about the Bangkok Rules and enhance discussion on women's imprisonment at the global level, ICPA and TIJ will jointly host the first global **Women in Corrections Conference (WICC)** in 2025 in Bangkok, Thailand. This conference aims to:

- Promote the **sharing of academic research and practical experience** to improve the treatment of corrections-involved women.
- **Raise Awareness** about the root causes, conditions, and challenges faced by corrections-involved women.
- **Share Information and best practices** that address the specific needs of corrections-involved women and / or relating to the implementation of the Bangkok Rules.
- **Encourage discussion on practice and policy reforms** to encourage positive changes for corrections-involved women.
- Commemorate the 15th Anniversary of the **Bangkok Rules**.
- Recognize the vital role of **women working in the corrections profession**.

The Justice 21 Committee of the Society for the Study of Social Problems (SSSP) is currently working on the third iteration of the publication the Global Agenda for Social Justice. Chapter drafts will be due April 14, 2025, and final manuscripts will be due September 01, 2025. Final contributions will be limited to 3000 words maximum (or roughly ten double-spaced manuscript pages). The volume is expected to launch in August 2026. You do not need to be a SSSP member to submit a chapter proposal.


